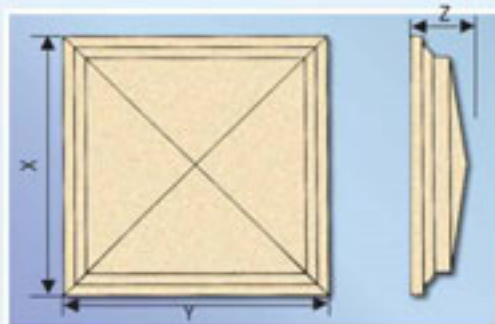

The use of stone as a veneer covering a more pragmatic structural framing or bearing wall has been explored at least as far back as classical Rome.

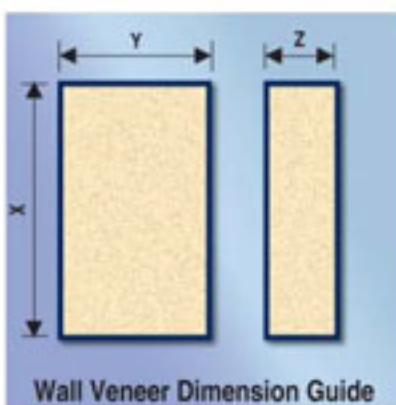
Later in history, stone veneer was used extensively in the construction of castles and towers.

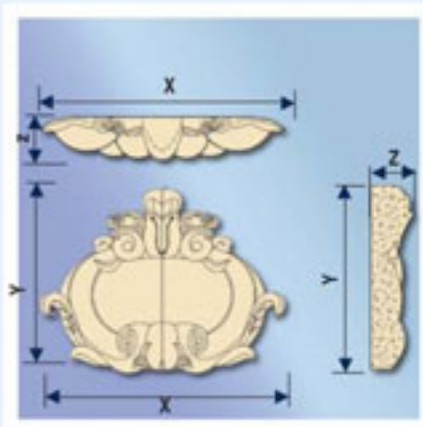

Having gained popularity in the United States in the 1860s, Cast Stone had become widely accepted as an economical substitute for natural stone by the early decades of the 20th century. Now, it's considered an important historic material in it's own right. While some use of cast stone may be dated to the Middle Ages, more recent efforts to replicate natural stone began in England and France at the end of the 18th century.
